### HISTORY FAIR – RESEARCH PHASE

**Directions:** Now that you have some sources, you need to organize the information. Your job today is to complete the following:

1. Re-read the source you brought to class today. Underline/highlight any important information.
  - a. Remember: You need to be able to relate the source to the History Fair theme! Ask yourself, "How does this relate to Revolution/Reaction/Reform?"
  - b. You also need to look for ways to support your preliminary thesis/argument. In other words, you are looking for your **PROOF** in your sources.
2. After you have re-read and underlined, you are ready to start creating your note cards.
  - a. The purpose of the notecard is to help you organize your proof
  - b. For each source, you should have at LEAST 4 notecards. Some sources may require more.
  - c. One side of the notecard should list the BIBLIOGRAPHICAL information of the source (Hint: see your bibliography info from the previous class)
  - d. The other side of the notecard lists the following:
    - i. A quote from the source
    - ii. An explanation of the quote or notes on how it will help you argue your point
    - iii. The page number where the quote was found
    - iv. A theme or section of your paper that the quote helps you support.
    - v. See Mrs. Brown's amazing diagrams below
